$Pastoral \ Letter \ {}_{\text{by David Heimann}}$



"There always were and still are people who can see a greater light and lay down their gifts in the service of a higher power." Today is the Feast of the Epiphany, the celebration in which we recall the coming of the Magi (the Three Kings) to pay homage to Jesus. They were the first Gentiles (non-Jews) to recognize Jesus as the Christ and thus for many centuries and for many cultures (all of whom are non-Jews), today is a more important holiday than Christmas. It is when they recall that Jesus is a light to all nations, not just the Jewish people.

It is also just after New Years and many of us have a tradition of making a New Year's Resolution. For me, my resolution for 2021 is based on an epiphany that I had just a few weeks ago.

In relaying the story that I am about to tell, I'll be intentionally vague because I know the details could potentially trigger somebody. As I thought about it, I came to realize that the details didn't matter. The story is universal to all of our experience and starts with the often-upsetting reality of social media. I have a habit of being friends with people on both sides of the political aisle and at the same time, I have very little patience for ignorance.

A friend of mind has been had a habit of posting opinions that I found vitriolic. They were divisive, contrary to regularly accessible facts, rooted in radical disregard for other's feelings, and just rude. I had been thinking about unfriending him for months and never could do it. If nothing else, I enjoyed his role in my life of supplying me with an opposing point of view.

Then, in a rare moment of self-revelation that was contrary to his typical maelstrom, he wrote a post in mid-December that crystallized the impetus for his antipathy. His mother died. And the things he rails against in society are the factors that kept him from being the son he wanted to be for her when she was dying. The situation was tragic and it touched my heart.

This was the moment of my own personal epiphany, to recognize that vitriol and anger are not fostered in a vacuum. They come from a legitimate place of unattended pain that litters the soul with rancor. What results is a festering shadow of a human being and endless alienation from one another.

And so, my resolution is to remember that every pain comes from a pain and to grant those who act out of anger a moment of forbearance. 2020 was rough, but let's be honest, 2021 is not going to be easy either. There is no magic wand that has been waived to make all our problems disappear.

No magic, but yes... magi (notice the absence of the "c"). There always were and still are people who can see a greater light and lay down their gifts in the service of a higher power. The choice to make a better world is inspired by Christ and implemented by us. If we can begin by recognizing the woundedness in others, we stand the chance of understanding them and then forgiving them. This is a kindness we can show that will not only keep us from being wounded in the process of their rage, but it may help all of us heal as well.

Here is to 2021 and epiphanies that continue to transform us all of us!



Blessing Your Home on Epiphany

Perhaps you are familiar with an Irish New Year's Eve tradition: opening the back door of your home to let the old year out. But do you know about the Catholic household blessing? It's one our youth group has carried out at Saint Andrew for the last two years!

On the Feast of the Epiphany, the family gathers to ask God's blessing on their home and on those who live in or visit the home. It is an invitation for Jesus to be a daily guest in our home, our comings and goings, our conversations, our work and play, our joys and sorrows.

Considering the year we are leaving behind, we may strongly desire to have God bless us in the year ahead!

Suggested Format for a Blessing

All: [make the Sign of the Cross]

Leader: Peace be to this house and to all who dwell here, in the name of the Lord.

All: Thanks be to God.

Leader: [read Matthew 2:1-12, then] The word of the Lord.

ALL: Thanks be to God

Using chalk, write one of the following on the outside of your house or inside above the front main entrance:

+20 Christus Mansionem Benedicat 21+ +20 Caspar Melchior Balthazar 21+ +20 C M B 21+

All: Lord God of heaven and earth, you revealed your only begotten Son to every nation by the guidance of a star. Bless this house, all who live here, and all who visit. May we be blessed with health, kindness of heart, gentleness and the keeping of your law. Fill us with the light of Christ, that our love for each other may go out to all. We ask this through Christ our Lord. Amen.
