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# Pastoral Letter

*“Who teaches us to listen to God?”*

In the lowlands of Africa, in areas of Ethiopia and Kenya, lives a very small yellowish or reddish antelope, named Gunther’s Antelope. This little guy only weighs about 10 pounds when fully grown, and is only about a foot tall. A group of biologists were out in the area studying a species of bird, the Grey Lourie, when they noticed an interesting connection between the Grey Lourie and the Gunther’s Antelope.

Since the antelope are so small, they have a long list of predators, including raptors like hawks and falcons, who are also direct predators for the Grey Lourie. When this particular species of bird sees a raptor, they have a distinctive warning call to alert the rest of their flock, and the biologists noticed that the Gunther’s Antelope also reacted to the warning call, and they, too, hid from the raptors.

So the scientists, being scientists, wanted to test the theory to see if the antelope really react to the bird call. And after their testing, they concluded that the antelope reacted only to the specific warning cry that meant a raptor was in the area. But they couldn’t answer what, to me, is the real question: Who taught the antelope to understand bird?

And we can ask the same question of ourselves. Who teaches us to understand God? And maybe I should rephrase that a bit, since I don’t think any of us really understand God. Who teaches us to listen to God?

In the middle of the transfiguration story, we hear the voice of God telling us the answer, “This is my beloved son. Listen to him.” Like the antelope listening to the bird calls on the savannah, when we listen to the voice of Jesus, it leads away from fear and death, and brings grace and blessings.

Peter, James, and John wanted to build tents. They wanted to call the transfiguration an end, a glorious spot where you literally have a mountaintop experience, where you feel the holiness, where you are blinded by the majesty of the divine. Let’s linger in the moment, they said to themselves.

But the voice of Jesus doesn’t tell us to linger on a mountaintop. It tells us that we must be continually open to transforming ourselves, transforming our world, because we’re never really done. This isn’t an invitation to stick in a place we already know, it isn’t a calling to stay on top of the mountain, or to think that we’ve somehow reached a conclusion. Instead, we keep listening to Jesus, we go back down the mountain, back down into the peaks and valleys of life. The challenge of listening to Jesus is the challenge of putting radical transformation into practice.

So who taught the Gunther’s antelope to speak bird? With animals, we move to scientific concepts like symbiotic relationships and co-development. But I like to think that it is all about who you hang out with. The antelope and the birds are very different, but by hanging out together they learn each other’s language. When we hang out with Jesus, we learn God’s language. And, most importantly, we then can put that language in practice when we hang out with the world.

# Learn at Home, for Individuals & Families

## Option for the Poor and Vulnerable

It's not unusual for people to misunderstand this aspect of Catholic Social Teaching. "Option" sounds like our marginalized sisters and brothers have a list of items to choose from. Occasionally the pillar is called the "preferential option," which can be even more confusing. What does it mean?

Consider Jesus's life as our model. After all, Jesus was born to a poor family, in a poor community, and he ministered precisely to and among those marginalized members of his community. He lived alongside them, shared his meals and conversation with the poor, and encountered them with a closeness that we may find uncomfortable. But the simplicity of these actions - allowing what he saw, heard, and felt to touch him deeply - are what made Jesus's love so radical. He did not stay at a distance from those who were in need. He put them first.

The poor do not choose to be poor. They are made so by a lack of love, whether that is a lack of love from individuals or unjust structures that are in place. So when we consider how we may help the poor, we obviously can start with answering their immediate needs of food, shelter, clothing, and water. However, we also need to ask the question, "How did this come about? What needs to change so my brother or sister doesn't have to live this way? How can I help that to happen?" When we work to solve both problems, by being charitable and seeking justice, we have a real chance of making lasting change.


