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Pastoral Letter by David Heimann, Pastoral Associate



"We can pull from the goodness within ourselves and share it with others." When we can't do everything that we want and choose to do, doing what we can still directs the moral and spiritual trajectory of our lives. Do our actions move us closer to God or do our actions move us farther away?

Things are getting back to some sense of normalcy in society and in the parish. As the Director of Religious Education for the parish, this time of year is usually marked for me by the retreats that are provided for our seventh and eighth graders as they prepare for the Sacrament of Confirmation.

This past week, we had the first of these in the Archdiocesan event known as "Holy Fire." To accommodate the experience in a pandemic, the students gathered in our auditorium and watched a broadcast of the event which was simulcast to parishes and schools across the Archdiocese. It was nothing like the event has been in the past where thousands of Catholic students go down to the UIC Pavillion and experience the church in a vibrant shout of joy. But it was still remarkable.

Having it in the parish while still seeing the vastness of the church in the Archdiocese allowed us to see other things of importance. For one, the smaller Mass that was held in our own church allowed us to digest the word of God in a deeper way. During Mass, I was struck by the words of the First Reading which stated, "I myself am convinced about you, my brothers and sisters, that you yourselves are full of goodness." Romans 15:14.

It reminded me once again of how good our young people at Saint Andrew are. Not only our students, but our families, our single young adults, our older parishioners, many of whom are widowers and widows. Take a look in the mirror and remember how good you are! I don't think you get told that enough and worse yet, our own judgement gets in the way of hearing that.

I'm directly pushing back at the old "If I can't have everything, I might as well have nothing" mentality. I've seen it so many times in the pandemic... "Well, If I can't go to Mass, then I won't do anything." "If I can't go and have my mask off, then I don't even want to go." "If the pandemic isn't over, then I can't _____" Fill in the blank for yourself.

This Sunday's Gospel reinforces the importance of doing what you can, even if it isn't everything you want. Jesus tells the story of a widow who had very little, but the little she had, she gave. Jesus says that she has given more than anyone else.

It isn't just about an equivocation of percentages that Jesus extols. All of us want to do good, but we get intimidated by the limitations in front of us. Sometimes those limitations are external, but the biggest limitations are usually internal, our own self assessments driven by fear, shame, and doubt.


We need to be reminded more than once that "You are full of goodness." We need to be reminded to act like the widow. Even if we can't give \$15,000 to buy a new altar for the parish or \$10,000 for our much needed tuckpointing. We can give something. We can pull from the goodness within ourselves and share it others.

Learn at Home, for Individuals & Families

Jesus, Savior and Brother

Our knowledge of Jesus's earthly life is limited in scope. We learn about his ministry through the Gospels, but the majority of his life remains in shadow. Ask children to tell you about Jesus, and it's likely that they will focus on his birth and death: Christmas and Easter.

If we accept that Jesus truly lived among us, we begin to understand the marvelous relationship we have with him. Jesus experienced frustration (John 2:15-16), temptation (Mark 1:13) weariness (John 4:6), disappointment (Luke 13:34) and ridicule (Mark 15:19). He was a child and a teenager. He grew into a man who was frequently an outsider, who chose to do the right thing, even when it meant suffering.

We also profess Jesus as our Savior. He is the new covenant - the one who conquered death, the sign of our salvation. A "salve" is an ointment that heals and soothes. Jesus's most significant miracle was not to raise Lazarus from the dead or give sight to the blind, though these are the miracles we seem to remember best. Jesus's most significant miracle was in the healing of our woundedness. We participate in this incredible gift of reconciliation through our Baptism, when we go to Confession, in the Anointing of the Sick, and at the celebration of the Eucharist.

Jesus is more than just Christmas and Easter, more than birth and death - he is in the living of our lives. As fully human, he sees and understands the messes we get into because he's been there. And as fully God, he can help us put things back in order... all we have to do is ask.
