Pastoral Letter by Deacon Eric Sorensen



"Pope Francis asks each of us to help. "Let us pray that people who suffer from depression or burnout will find support and a light that opens them up to life."" Every time I hear St Paul's reading to the Philippians, it brings a sad smile to my face. It reminds me of a Lector at my old family parish in Detroit. For some reason, she always seemed to be scheduled to proclaim this reading, "Rejoice in the Lord always. I shall say it again: rejoice...The Lord is near." It was proclaimed like a dirge, a mournful lament. Much like Eeyore, Winnie-the-Pooh's donkey friend, it sounded sad and gloomy. Perhaps the lector was depressed, but I didn't know her well. I should have reached out and tried to listen to her, just as Winnie-the-Pooh did for Eeyore.

This is especially a difficult time for many during this holiday season. The days are shorter, as the dark descends. The cold weather drives us inside, perhaps to further isolation. The increased stress of creating a perfect holiday only leads to unrealistic expectations. Perhaps, we feel fatigued, tense, frustrated, lonely, sad or a sense of loss. Perhaps we just don't feel like rejoicing, even though the Lord is very near.

Pope Francis asks each of us to help. "Let us pray that people who suffer from depression or burnout will find support and a light that opens them up to life." And we...reveal the light, as the faithful. But first, we must address our own mental health. Perhaps it needs a boost through exercise, getting enough sleep, eating and drinking in moderation, finding ways to relax, or setting reasonable holiday goals. Thus, allowing ourselves to be without anxieties and knowing the peace of God that guards our hearts and minds in Christ Jesus – *the reason for the season*.

In the Advent spirit, we bring the light to each other's lives. We stay in touch with family, friends, and neighbors so that they know they are not alone and loved. We help to lift the burden of their worries by taking the time to listen and care. Through our volunteering and support we witness to the presence of Christ in their lives. And we encourage their healing through professional help, and the healing and comfort only God can give.

Yes, we are the light to the world! We are the Advent faithful, rejoicing always, for we know the Lord is near. So, let us go forth and bring the universal message of peace and unity to all in need. And through our support welcome them home to St Andrew community. They may sound like Eeyore, but we know they are indeed our friends, our brothers and sisters in Christ.

May the joy of this Advent season be with you...all year long. Rejoice Always! Deacon Eric

Celebrating Advent Together

Ask a typical first grader about the liturgical year, and you will likely hear about Christmas, Easter, and Ordinary (or "oh, ya know.. just the *regular*") time. There is usually some confusion about the difference between Advent and Lent. What is very clear to these young people is that both are a period of intense waiting... particularly when it comes to Christmas. So how can we celebrate advent in a special way at home?

For some, taking turns lighting each candle of an advent wreath indicates that the weeks are ticking by. Advent calendars are all over grocery stores, containing scripture passages or small treats, giving us a foretaste of the sweetness of Christmas. If you attend mass at Saint Andrew or have watched a live stream recently, you may have noticed the large advent wreath in front of the Mary altar. We can think of this as our parish family's wreath!

Others may have a nativity in their home, and traditions vary from family to family about who appears in the nativity at a certain time. Many hide baby Jesus in a special place until Christmas Eve or Christmas Day (don't forget where he is!). It can also be fun for your three kings to go on an adventure through your home as they follow the star to Bethlehem, arriving on Epiphany to celebrate Jesus with gold, frankincense and myrrh.

Advent is a season of anticipation and a season of Hope. The coming of Jesus in Advent is bound up with the reason for his birth - to be Savior of the World. His coming is threefold: We celebrate Jesus's first coming in the Nativity, live in expectation of his second coming at the end of time, as well as rejoice in his presence in our midst today as risen Lord.

However you celebrate Advent, allow yourself to live in the reason for THIS season.
