Pastoral Letter by Deacon Mark Purdome



"Saint Nicholas teaches us more about giving than getting." This week we celebrate Saint Nicholas Day on Monday, December 6. It is my favorite Saint's day, not because Saint Nick is the patron saint of children, but because it is my birthday - really, it is quite amazing that I'm not named Nick, but my mother didn't remember that it was Saint Nicholas Day until after I was already named. Since it is my birthday, it has always been a party day for me, but many, especially in Eastern Europe, also celebrate the feast of Saint Nicholas with gift giving and gatherings.

We don't know much about Saint Nicholas. While we know that he was a bishop in during the fourth century, very little is known about his life. He is remembered as a man of great faith and compassion. But he left behind no writings: the legends surrounding his life are all we have.

But the legends are compelling. According to tradition, Nicholas' parents died when he was young, leaving him a large sum of money. With his inheritance, Nicholas practiced charity, helping those in need. One legend in particular is used to explain the tradition of hanging up stockings at Christmas.

It seems that a poor man in the community didn't have enough money to pay a dowry so that his three daughters could get married. In his time, a father had to pay the groom an amount of money on the wedding day, and so his daughters couldn't get married, and were likely to be sold as slaves. Saint Nicholas heard of the man's plight, and so, as the legend goes, he dropped three bags of gold down the chimney. The bags happened to fall into a stocking hanging to dry, and people began to attribute secret gifts to the Saint.

But Saint Nicholas teaches us more about giving than getting. It is easy to get caught up in the buying and giving presents to family and friends, but the most poignant lesson is in how Saint Nicholas, either in legend or fact, is the giver of gifts that give freedom from poverty and desperation. His life is characterized by true charity, and is an example of how we, too, should seek to act in this season of giving.

As we continue the season of Advent, as we decorate our homes with stockings and plan for the joy of Christmas, let's look around at the needs of those around us. Let's celebrate in the spirit of Saint Nicholas, not only giving and getting gifts, but taking action to end poverty and desperation.

Since 2015, Saint Andrew Parish and School has partnered with Saint Mary of the Lake and St. Thomas of Canterbury, located in the Uptown neighborhood, with a Christmas service project through a Giving Tree. Saint Andrew has helped students ranging from Pre-K thru 8th grade stay warm over the cold, winter, Chicago months.

The trees are up and stocked full of ornaments! There is one inside the Saint Andrew School and another in the back of Saint Andrew Church. Families will be able to select these ornaments off the trees and begin their holiday shopping. For our Early Childhood kids, there will be ornaments available in the classroom to send home or pick up during drop off or pick up times. Look for emails from your kids' teachers on those details.

Giving Tree volunteers will also be handing out ornaments several days a week at drop off and pick up starting **Monday**, **November 29**th – **Wednesday**, **December 8**th with our "**MOBILE GIVING TREE**". Please stop by and grab some ornaments for these well deserving kids!

As a reminder, here's how it will work:

Each student from Saint Mary of the Lake and St. Thomas of Canterbury is going to receive a gift from a Saint Andrew family (families can take more than one child if they choose) equaling <u>no more</u> than \$25.00. This gift will include two (2) **NEW** items from a pair of gloves/mittens, socks, a winter hat or scarf. Please refrain from purchasing toys, coats, candy, etc. How thankful these children will be to have two brand new winter warmth items this Christmas!

Once your shopping is complete, please return the two (2) **NEW, UNWRAPPED** items **AND** the **ORNAMENT** in a ziplock bag to either the school or the rectory by **THURSDAY, DECEMBER 9th**. Please DO NOT leave any items under the tree in the Church.

Celebrating Advent Together

Ask a typical first grader about the liturgical year, and you will likely hear about Christmas, Easter, and Ordinary (or "oh, ya know.. just the *regular*") time. There is usually some confusion about the difference between Advent and Lent. What is very clear to these young people is that both are a period of intense waiting... particularly when it comes to Christmas. So how can we celebrate advent in a special way at home?

For some, taking turns lighting each candle of an advent wreath indicates that the weeks are ticking by. Advent calendars are all over grocery stores, containing scripture passages or small treats, giving us a foretaste of the sweetness of Christmas. If you attend mass at Saint Andrew or have watched a live stream recently, you may have noticed the large advent wreath in front of the Mary altar. We can think of this as our parish family's wreath!

Others may have a nativity in their home, and traditions vary from family to family about who appears in the nativity at a certain time. Many hide baby Jesus in a special place until Christmas Eve or Christmas Day (don't forget where he is!). It can also be fun for your three kings to go on an adventure through your home as they follow the star to Bethlehem, arriving on Epiphany to celebrate Jesus with gold, frankincense and myrrh.

Advent is a season of anticipation and a season of Hope. The coming of Jesus in Advent is bound up with the reason for his birth - to be Savior of the World. His coming is threefold: We celebrate Jesus's first coming in the Nativity, live in expectation of his second coming at the end of time, as well as rejoice in his presence in our midst today as risen Lord.

However you celebrate Advent, allow yourself to live in the reason for THIS season.
