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Day of Prayer for Peace in Ukraine - March 2, 2021

Pope Francis has called upon Catholics to enter into a day of fasting and prayer on Ash Wednesday, March 2, 2021 for the sake of Peace in Ukraine.

"Despite the diplomatic efforts of the last few weeks," the Pope said, "increasingly alarming scenarios are opening up," with many people all over the world feeling anguish and pain. Once again the peace of all is threatened by partisan interests," he stressed. Pope Francis appealed to those "with political responsibility to examine their consciences seriously before God, who is the God of peace and not of war, who is the Father of all, not just of some, who wants us to be brothers and not enemies."

He also prayed that "all the parties involved refrain from any action that would cause even more suffering to the people, destabilizing coexistence between nations and bringing international law into disrepute."

Speaking at the pope's general audience, he called on believers "in a special way to dedicate themselves intensely to prayer and fasting on that day" as he expressed his deep sadness at the worsening international situation.



I invite everyone to make this coming 2nd March, Ash Wednesday, a Day of Fasting for Peace: let believers dedicate themselves intensively to prayer and fasting. May the Queen of Peace preserve the world from the madness of war.

"May we adhere to the care God has for us all." Perhaps you have heard about the difference between *knowledge* and *wisdom*. The saying goes, *"Knowledge* is knowing that a tomato is a fruit. *Wisdom* is knowing not to put it in a fruit salad."

The playful pirouette of wording might give us a slight chuckle or even the slight tilt of a smile when we hear it. Such are the sayings of wisdom (proverbs) which land abundantly upon us in this Sunday's Sacred Scriptures. There are so many prolific quips this weekend, it is almost like a snow squall. Their rapid fire litany makes it difficult to digest their impact without slowing them down a bit.

We're probably familiar with the one that goes "How can you say to your brother, 'Brother, let me remove that splinter in your eye,' when you do not even notice the wooden beam i your own eye.' (Luke 6:41) It is a classic aphorism to pull out on anyone who's narcissism demonstrates blatant hypocrisy. But it's also funny. If you slow down and imagine the ridiculous nature of the example Jesus illustrates, you can't help but chuckle. Who can see the speck in another's eye when you've got a two-by-four in front of you?

I personally get a chuckle out of Luke 6:44 "For people do not pick figs from thornbushes, nor do they gather grapes from brambles." While I've never been involved in the agriculture of figs or grapes, the metaphor sticks. Perhaps a modern day parallel is that you can't purchase software from the detergent aisle at the grocery store.

We can laugh at wisdom's precepts, but the acquisition of wisdom is hardly easy. Too often, as we daringly dash to confront the world with brazen innocence, our mistakes our pointed out to us by the more experienced and knowing. With admonition comes shame and guilt. I wish it weren't so.

Even recently, within the governance of our parish I have advocated, "Why don't we just tear the building down?" (referring to the Annex building on the corner of Paulina and Addison). The answer came back, "When do you propose we remove the asbestos? Before the building comes down or after everyone breathes it into their lungs?"

There are parishioners more informed than me and for that I am grateful. In fact, as I look around Saint Andrew Parish, I am repeatedly thankful that there are people more experienced and wiser. If I bring any wisdom to the conversation, it is in acknowledging that communities are not companies. They are not corporations who are judged on the contents of financial spreadsheet.

Our bottom line, our balance sheet is one that takes the long view. It is a place that grows the fruit of compassion, of love, of families valued for their journey, of individuals who may have stopped by only once, but know, "I was moved closer to God by the touch of God's wisdom." Sometimes we measure the fruit of Saint Andrew Parish by the smile of a First Communicant and sometimes by the tear of a widower at a funeral. It is only evident when we look at the whole picture and see the good work God has done in each of us.

Or as the First Reading puts it this weekend, "The fruit of a tree shows the care it has had." (Sirach 27:6). May we adhere to the care God has for us all.

The Sacraments

In *Living the Sacraments*, author Joe Paprocki describes the sacraments as "thin moments," significant opportunities when "we find ourselves encountering and keenly aware of the divine presence." Kathleen Hughes, RSJ, sees the sacraments as opportunities to "[hallow and celebrate] everyday experience, inviting us to deeper participation of the mystery of God with us."

When we celebrate a sacrament, we celebrate in a very tangible way the intangible God - we have a visible reminder of God's love for us. These are not the only moments when we encounter God, but they are moments when we can see and hear God acting directly through the sacramental rites to touch us, individually.

Take some time this week to contemplate how you live the sacraments daily.

Sacraments of Christian Initiation

(Baptism, Confirmation, Eucharist)

- Do I put pressure on myself to be perfect or complete in God's eyes? Can I allow myself the grace to be "on the journey" of conversion?

Sacraments of Healing

(Penance and Reconciliation, Anointing of the Sick)

 Am I holding back forgiveness and healing from those who I have hurt or who have hurt me? Do I practice the corporal works of mercy?

Sacraments of Service

(Matrimony, Holy Orders)

 Do I spend a great deal of time turning in toward myself and my own concerns? How am I serving others? Do I expect something in return? Do I graciously allow others to help me?
