
All are welcome to join us for Mass at the following times:

Pastoral Letter

“This may be our most challenging prayer, for in it we may learn that the will of God is that we drastically change our ways of thinking, and acting.”

Thanks to the generosity of our parish’s founding families, Saint Andrew Church is blessed to have beautiful stained glass windows. One window in particular, the Agony in the Garden, is a personal source of comfort and assurance to me during troubling times. I am confident that many others also find comfort in this window’s image.

This past week our country once again witnessed tragic school shooting in Texas and the week before the mass shootings in Buffalo, New York and Laguna Woods, California. The former tragedy is egregious for the attack on innocent children and the former tragedies are egregious since the shooters were clearly motivated by intense racial hatred. And the fact that the Laguna Woods shooting was yet another incident that occurred in a church rocks our sense of sanctuary that all places of worship provide. As always, we find ourselves wondering, “when will it ever end?”

In last week’s gospel Jesus offers his disciples, and us the gift of peace, “Peace I leave with you; my peace I give to you.” Now more than ever our world needs peace. But Jesus is quick to clarify that the peace he gives is not like the peace that the world offers: “Not as the world gives do I give it to you.”

So how is the peace that Jesus gives different from the world’s peace? And how can we attain it? As Jesus carried out his ministry he frequently took time away from the daily routine of life to connect with his Father in prayer, after which he continued on his journey, intensely focused on doing the will of the Father. This was Jesus’ anchor in troubling times. As Jesus prayed in the Garden of Gethsemane, he struggled with the knowledge of his imminent death. In his prayer we hear him say, “Father, if you are willing, take this cup away from me; still, not my will but yours be done.”

Too many previous mass shootings have resulted in countless discussions, but no progress on getting control of the problem. We frequently say in these situations, “thoughts and prayers.” But, do we really pray, or do we just say that because other words fail us? It is obvious that our previous attempts to address hatred and violence in our country have been unsuccessful and they will likely continue to be unsuccessful if we do not truly pray, but pray as Jesus did; by connecting with God and earnestly praying, “not my will but yours be done.”

This may be our most challenging prayer, for in it we may learn that the will of God is that we drastically change our ways of thinking, and acting. We may find that we have been complicit to some degree, and the change needs to begin with us by turning away from all forms of violence, hatred and discrimination. We may discover that no form of violence or hatred is every justifiable, such as our road rage, or our contempt for our neighbor. Perhaps then if we all went through a personal agony in the garden, where we each confronted our own sinfulness, and asked God that His will be done and not our own will to exact justice on the road, or harbor grudges, we may finally find the peace that Jesus found, and gave to us.



Scripture Reflection by Deacon Mark



“The story of Saint Stephen is a beacon of light for us in this crazy and frustrating world.”

In Chicago, we celebrate the Feast of the Ascension today, so we miss out on the readings chosen for the Seventh Sunday of Easter which feature Saint Stephen. Stephen was one of the first deacons chosen by the apostles to “serve at table”, although the sixth and seventh chapters of the Acts of the Apostles don’t feature Stephen in his role of serving widows and orphans. Rather, the first deacons are shown to be out preaching the Word of God in the community. Stephen is shown to be a powerful and fearless preacher, standing up to the authorities and, according to Acts 6:10, “they could not withstand the wisdom and the spirit with which he spoke.” So they accused him of blasphemy, drove him from the city, and stoned him, making him the first Christian martyr.

It is interesting to contemplate the story of Stephen, because there’s not much of a market for prophets and martyrs in our current world. Being a follower of Christ isn’t always taking the safe road. Do we realize what we’re getting ourselves into when we so readily celebrate Christ’s Paschal mystery?

After all, Jesus was branded as revolutionary. He preached a radical form of love – to love our enemies, not just our friends. And his inclusiveness really pushed the boundaries since he associated with sinners and tax collectors. When the early Christians put his words into actions, they were met with resistance, with prison, and with torture.

As Fr. John Kavanaugh wrote, the faith of Saint Stephen should be a real challenge to us because we have erected a wall of separation between faith and public life:

- Christ’s teachings about money and power are gently and graciously ignored when real power and good money are at stake.
- His teachings about forgiveness and love dissolve away when we are confronted with a real enemy.
- His warnings about priestly privilege somehow do not apply to the powerful in the Church.
- His concern for the alien and homeless is presumed to be directed to some other group than the poor in our midst or the immigrant and refugee.

The story of Saint Stephen is a beacon of light for us in this crazy and frustrating world. He was willing to work to truly implement the teachings of Jesus, and live life in a way that allowed Jesus’ love to flow out into the world. Even in the midst of torture, Stephen cried out in prayer for his enemies: “Lord do not hold this sin against them.”

Saint Stephen, Deacon and Martyr, your zeal for the Kingdom was demonstrated in your compassion for your persecutors and your courage in following Jesus Christ. Intercede for us that we, too, may live lives that are compassionate and just. Amen.




Celebrating Mr. Allen Ackermann

The Easter Season

Pop quiz! Which season is longer: Lent or Easter? Most of us are familiar with the 40 days of Lent, and might think that Easter only lasts one day. But the Easter season officially lasts 50 days!

When we are gathered for mass, we see and hear these changes in the liturgy: the deep purple vestments give way to bright white, the Gloria is sung again, and the bareness of the altar would be covered in beautiful flowers. These signs tell us Jesus is risen!

The Easter season does not end with Jesus' return to heaven, on the Ascension of our Lord. He promised his disciples that he would send an "advocate," which is sometimes translated to "helper." This promise was the gift of the Holy Spirit, which instructs and guides us individually and as a church to grow in love and knowledge of God. We celebrate the gift of the Holy Spirit on Pentecost Sunday, which officially concludes the season. (That's this weekend!)

But if the Holy Spirit is still with us, does Easter really end? Maybe not. Saint Augustine once said, "We are an Easter people, and Alleluia is our song!"

At Home with Emmaus ([Luke 24:13-35](#))

The gospel story of the Road to Emmaus provides us with ways to celebrate the Easter season. We can...

... read the Old Testament, and discover the scripture Jesus "opened" to the disciples. Try [Dt 18:15](#), [Psalm 22:1-18](#), and [Isaiah 53](#)

... go for a walk. Invite Jesus to meet you on the road, especially if your heart feels heavy.

... bake bread; Jesus revealed himself in the breaking of it. [Here are 50 quick breads](#). Hey! That's one for every day of Easter!

When our prayer is shattered by immense ubiquity of any sort and the number of challenges we face are too numerous to bear, praying in the form a litany can be helpful. The repetition of a short refrain over several invocations heightens our acclamation to God and helps to deepen a prayer's movement upon our hearts.

The litany composed below is sobering to complete, but it is our honest starting point to move beyond "thoughts and prayers" into the action required of us as Christians in response to the deep travesty of gun violence. Please pray it with an open and sincere heart.
