Dear Parish Family,



### Teens & High School



# Scripture Reflection by David Heimann, Pastoral Associate

The readings at the beginning of Advent this year are about *hope*, the belief that things can and do get better. We hear about this hope first in the Book of Jeremiah. The prophet says "The days are coming, says the Lord, when I will fulfill the promise I made to the house of Israel and Judah... In those days Judah shall be safe and Jerusalem shall dwell secure;" (JER 33:14, 16)

It is one of a couple hundred passages in the Bible where the People of God cultivate an internal energy for the prospect of change. In each of those cases, there is usually some form of oppression or limitation upon the writer (or the People of God) and the writing helps lift the spirits of the reader towards a future goal.

In the case of the prophet Jeremiah, the kingdom of Juda was in its final days around 612 B.C. as the Babylonians sacked the Assyrian empire to the North and were coming for Judah next. For Jeremiah and the inhabitants of Judah, their hope was in God.

What is striking about *hope* is that it is always placed on the edge of human limitation. Charles Synder defined hope as "the sum of the mental willpower and waypower that you have for your goals." Notice that we don't have hope for something that is a "sure thing" and we don't have hope for things that are impossible. But the distance between

the two requires an intra-personal capital that we can define as *hope*, the sum of our willpower and waypower.

Also notice that what is perceived of as "impossible" has changed throughout history. In some periods, when things were so dire that hope could not be found in this world, then the hope-filled person transferred their willpower and waypower to the after-life, the ultimate end boundary where God resides.

But there is a shadowy side effect of projecting hope toward the after-life. It postpones the possibility of finding God here and now. It isn't to say that we don't find God at the end of time but alarm bells should be going off in our spiritual lives when we solely place hope in the afterlife. This isn't the full Christian story, especially for those of us preparing for Christmas.

The story we proclaim as Christians is not that God waits to meet us until we reach the end of days, but instead that God meets us here and now, in Jesus. He is known as "Emmanuel" which literally means "God is with us." This is our profound belief. Even if things are bad and unseemly, we do not need to live in despair for God has the will and the way to be with us now, through Jesus.

This is something that can truly give us *hope* during this season of Advent.



# Learn at Home, for Individuals & Families

### Advent - The Reason for This Season

Ask a typical first grader about the liturgical year, and you will likely hear about Christmas, Easter, and Ordinary (or "just the regular") time. There is usually some confusion about the difference between Advent and Lent. What is *very* clear to these young people is that both are a period of intense waiting.

Significantly, Advent is a season of Hope, whereas Lent is a season of Repentance. That sounds like a simple difference, but perhaps the confusion of our young friends reveals a deeper truth. The coming of Jesus in Advent is bound up with the reason for his birth - to be Savior of the World. The coming is threefold: We await Jesus's coming in the Nativity, but we also live in joyful expectation of his Second Coming at the end of time, as well as rejoice in his presence in our midst as risen Lord. This Advent, allow yourself to live in the reason for *this* season.

### Things to Do At Home:

<u>Pray</u>: Invest in a family advent wreath. Let the kids take turns lighting the candles and leading prayers.

Read: The Saint Who Would be Santa Claus, by Adam C. English. (St. Nicholas Day is December 6!)

Watch: Busted Halo's Two Minute Advent (YouTube)

Do: Slow down - enjoy the Advent season with family and friends by making homemade decorations, baking cookies, or making care packs for the homeless.

# The Giving Tree

### Season's Greetings!

Saint Andrew families have helped over 550 students ranging from Pre-K  $- 8^{th}$  grade stay warm over the cold, winter, Chicago months. Let's do our part again this year and help those who have less than this holiday season.

As a reminder, the Giving Trees are up and stocked with ornaments and are located in the back of the Church, in the school lobby, inside the JK classroom and outside Pre-K. We will also have volunteers handing out ornaments several days a week at drop off and pick up starting **Monday**, **November 26**<sup>th</sup> – **Wednesday**, **December 12**<sup>th</sup> with our "**MOBILE GIVING TREE**". That is when Saint Andrew families will be able to select these ornaments off the trees and begin their holiday shopping for these very deserving children.

As a reminder, here's how it will work:

Each child/student from St. Mary of the Lake and St. Thomas of Canterbury is going to receive a gift from a Saint Andrew family (families can take more than one child if they choose) equaling <u>no more</u> than \$25.00. This gift will include two (2) **NEW** items from a pair of
