Pastoral Letter by Deacon Mark Purdome



"In the world today, it may be challenging to respond 'all the time' to the call that 'God is good." A number of years ago, I went to a Lenten parish mission hosted at a large north suburban church. The mission speaker was from down south and he was a former Baptist preacher who had converted to Catholicism. He was an excellent speaker, and I thoroughly enjoyed his message as well as his style, which was more typical of a Black evangelical preacher than the typical style in this mostly-white congregation.

About 5 minutes into the first night, he proclaimed "God is GOOD!" ... and there was silence from the crowd. "God is GOOD!" he proclaimed again, and in the silence that followed, he looked up to heaven and said something along the lines of "O Lord, I need to teach them the response." So we practiced: "Good is good" is the call, and the response is "all the time." It is immediately followed by another call: "All the time", to which the crowd is expected to respond "God is good!"

This traditional call-and-response is heard in Black churches across the country, but it was unfamiliar, and uncomfortable, in this suburban setting. (On a side note, by the third night the crowd enthusiastically responded, so we did get into the spirit of the talk)

In the world today, it may be challenging to respond "all the time" to the call that "God is good". We are filled with so much worry, so much uncertainty. It is tough not to fall into despair.

Yet, today's Gospel points out just how good God can be. The landowner's approach to paying his laborers seems unfair unless we shift our perspective.

Sister Mary McGlone suggests that we need to look at this parable from the perspective of need, not effort. Our tendency is to assume that the workers hired later in the day had the easier time, because rather than toiling in the hot sun they spent the day being lazy. But perhaps those workers had spent the day fruitlessly seeking work, going from farm to farm to find employment, worrying more and more as the day went on that they would be unable to feed themselves and their family. Filled with worry and uncertainty about the future, they are on the edge of despair when they get an offer to work.

Regardless of when they started work, they needed to eat. Each still needed the daily wage to feed their family and meet their obligations.

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And the vineyard owner seemed more interested in supplying their need than in measuring their contribution to his task. In this case, justice was based not on energy expended but on each one's right to life.

God's goodness is far beyond our typical vision, far beyond our human notion of "fair". God wants us to enjoy divine goodness. Whether we start in the morning, noon, or evening, God doesn't judge based on effort, but on supplying our need.

We are tasked with doing the same. All around us are needs, and rather than judging worthiness based on effort, we are called to reach out with divine goodness. A word of hope to a neighbor on the edge of despair. An hour or two at a soup kitchen or at the Greater Chicago Food Depository to feed someone who is hungry. A listening ear for someone who has been stretched to their breaking point by the pandemic. We may be the ones who go out into the neighborhoods to model and teach the call-and-response:

God is GOOD, all the time! And all the time, God is GOOD!

Catholic Social Teaching: The Dignity of Work

Every September we celebrate Labor Day. This holiday emerged at the end of the 19th century during the Second Industrial Revolution, when large factories employed thousands of workers who operated in unsafe conditions and without fair pay. Labor Day provided an opportunity to celebrate the dignity of workers, which also happens to be a Catholic Social Teaching!

These days, we talk less about "labor" and more about "the state of the economy." News agencies report incessantly on the stock market and trade wars. What happens when we do this? We stop seeing people and start seeing statistics, margins, profits.

The word "economic" comes from the Greek word *oikonomia*, meaning "household management." So what if we consider modern economics less of a numbers game and more as the functioning of a well organized family unit? In an ideal family, each member helps as best they can with the gifts they have. All contributions are appreciated and valued.

Just as it is easy to feel underappreciated by family members, imagine how it might feel to be undervalued by an entire community? For workers who are paid less than minimum wage, who work multiple jobs without benefits, who face discrimination because of creed, color, or gender... this is a daily reality. Upholding the dignity of work means seeing everyone around us as important and valued.
