Saint Andrew Begins Live Streaming

At the beginning of the pandemic, many parishes rushed to provide alternatives to attending Mass. Without the proper equipment in the church to deliver audio and video to parishioners, Saint Andrew opted to focus on delivering an experience that households could do at home (*Your Sunday Connection*). We still maintain that this is the best way to nurture your spiritual life during the pandemic.



It is better to pray with your household (like Jesus did) than to consume Mass like a Television Show.

That being said, we have now invested in the video and audio systems necessary to live stream Mass. We did this because we knew we would have guests from around the country and around the world who would not be able to attend first communions, funerals, weddings, baptisms and confirmations. Now that the equipment is in place, we are also glad to provide live streaming of our Sunday Mass. While the pandemic continues, we hope that those who participate in this ministry by watching our Sunday Mass online will not lose the practice of household home-prayer that we have fostered these last few months.

Pastoral Letter by Deacon Eric Sorensen

This past weekend St Andrew celebrated a phenomenal service, the RCIA mass. This service was the long overdue Easter Vigil mass, that welcomes newly Baptized, Professions of Faith and the Confirmed into the Catholic faith. Fr. Sergio praised our new members for their patience, and their demonstration of their faith by overcoming the fears and inconveniences of COVID. They showed their faith with masks, by proper seating and maintaining social distance. They emerged from our church doors joyful and full of praise and thanksgiving for the gift of faith that had been provided for each of them.

We know the source of this gift of faith, the "encouragement of Christ". It was provided as St Paul says, not "out of selfishness or out of vainglory; rather, humbly regarding others as more important than yourselves". Yes, these are the volunteers that stepped forward to provide the safety against COVID, our St Andrew Reopening Team. "Each looking out not for his own interests, but also for those of others." (Phil 2:3-4) Without their gracious service, this RCIA mass would not have been possible, nor Sunday masses, nor First Communions, nor Baptisms, nor Funerals, nor Weddings, nor the example of being a Disciple of Christ.

The Archdiocesan newsletter, *On the Way*, has been trying to succinctly describe what is a disciple versus a disciple of Christ, a missionary disciple. They have proposed these definitions:

- A disciple is someone who has a heart for God and will make any sacrifice to personally grow.
- A Disciple of Christ, a missionary disciple, has a heart for people and will make any sacrifice to help others grow.

Disciples of Christ want to share their love, mercy and sense of belonging. They want God's people to know that they are not alone on this journey, and using whatever gifts they have, they work to build up the Kingdom of God.

In the Gospel of Matthew we hear Jesus ask, "Which of the two did his father's will?" The parable reinforces Jesus' insistence that words alone do not prove that one is his disciple. They must be accompanied by action. Jesus' parable challenges us to examine our own lives to determine whose will shapes our daily actions.

I too am challenged by Jesus' question. Yet, I am joyful when I see the support that our Reopening Team provides for our services. Their actions have definitely shown a heart for our parishioners. Their sacrifices of time, learning and caring serves as a great example of being a Disciple of Christ. I do believe their willingness to answer the call to serve is helping the rest of us to grow. But, I do know their discipleship is allowing us to celebrate together in faith, which many have said, "I feel safer from COVID in the church, than outside."



Congratulations to Saint Andrew School National Blue Ribbon Award Recipient!

Congratulations to Saint Andrew School which was recognized this past week as an award recipient by the Department of Education as a 2020 National Blue Ribbon School.

The National Blue Ribbon Schools Program recognizes public and private elementary, middle, and high schools based on their overall academic excellence or their progress in closing achievement gaps among student subgroups. Every year the U. S. Department of Education seeks out and celebrates great American schools, schools demonstrating that all students can achieve to high levels. Now in its 38th year, the National Blue Ribbon Schools Program has bestowed almost 10,000 awards to more than 9,000 schools, with some schools winning multiple awards. Schools are eligible for nomination after five years. The coveted National Blue Ribbon School award affirms the hard work of students, educators, families, and communities in creating safe and welcoming schools where students master challenging and engaging content. The National Blue Ribbon School flag gracing an entry or flying overhead is a widely recognized symbol of exemplary teaching and learning.

This is the second time that Saint Andrew School has received a National Blue Ribbon making it one of the few multiple award winners in Chicago.

Catholic Social Teaching: The Dignity of Work

Every September we celebrate Labor Day. This holiday emerged at the end of the 19th century during the Second Industrial Revolution, when large factories employed thousands of workers who operated in unsafe conditions and without fair pay. Labor Day provided an opportunity to celebrate the dignity of workers, which also happens to be a Catholic Social Teaching!

These days, we talk less about "labor" and more about "the state of the economy." News agencies report incessantly on the stock market and trade wars. What happens when we do this? We stop seeing people and start seeing statistics, margins, profits.

The word "economic" comes from the Greek word *oikonomia*, meaning "household management." So what if we consider modern economics less of a numbers game and more as the functioning of a well organized family unit? In an ideal family, each member helps as best they can with the gifts they have. All contributions are appreciated and valued.

Just as it is easy to feel underappreciated by family members, imagine how it might feel to be undervalued by an entire community? For workers who are paid less than minimum wage, who work multiple jobs without benefits, who face discrimination because of creed, color, or gender... this is a daily reality. Upholding the dignity of work means seeing everyone around us as important and valued.
