Pastoral Letter by Fr. Sergio Romo, Pastor



"It might be best to simply focus not so much on how we and the Holy Trinity are related, but that we are related. We are family." My mother comes from a very large family, which we would visit every summer in Mexico. Since my siblings and I only saw our extended family once a year, my mother would sometimes have to reintroduce us and explain how we were related. With so many aunts and uncles, cousins, and second cousins, it was hard to keep track of how we were all related to each other. After awhile, our sense of awkwardness dissipated as we focused not so much on how we were related, but that we were related. We were family.

Today the Church celebrates the Solemnity of the Most Holy Trinity. This great mystery has kept many homilists awake at night as they've struggled with how to preach on the Holy Trinity. Undoubtedly, some may have painted themselves into a corner in their explanations of how the three Persons in the Holy Trinity are related to each other, which may have precipitated a call from their bishop. Since the late second century, theologians, preachers, and believers have struggled to understand an infinite reality with only finite words and concepts as their tools. That's not to say that trying to understand such divine dynamics is a pointless exercise. God blessed humans with intellect and reason so as to be able to comprehend, or try to comprehend all kinds of mysteries, including the mystery of the Triune Godhead.

More important than comprehension though, God is inviting us into a divine relationship of love. The love that exists amongst the three Persons in the Holy Trinity is not a selfish love, meant for the exclusive benefit of God. Just as the love between two married people is extended to the love of children and family, so too does God's love extend to all peoples. The appropriate response then to the gift of the Holy Trinity's love, is to accept that love, and share it with everyone, with the same degree of generosity that God shares with us.

It would be very easy for us to get caught up in theological concepts in our trying to understand how the Persons in the Holy Trinity are related to each other, as well as to how by baptism we are related to the Holy Trinity. But after awhile, it might be best to simply focus not so much on how we and the Holy Trinity are related, but that we are related. We are family.

The Church: Community in the Spirit

The Church is a community - a community of people who profess the same belief in one God, led by the same Spirit, with a common mission: to proclaim the Good News of Jesus Christ's redeeming sacrifice. "We are all one..." but are we all the same?

We are all members of the Body of Christ. Just as the Body of Christ is one body, it is made up of different parts. In the same way, we serve different functions in the church, whether we are part of the laity, consecrated religious, or serving as clergy. Within these three groups we also serve in different ways. Some consecrated religious are devoted to prayer and contemplation, while others serve in missions around the world. Clergy might serve locally as pastors of a parish or at a high office in the Vatican. Lay people serve the church in their secular work (have you heard of "water-cooler evangelization?"), as well as when they become involved in parish life, from teaching Religious Education to serving on the Social Concerns Commision.

The same Spirit works uniquely in each of us for the benefit of all, sometimes even when bestowing the same gift! For example, someone may be a great public speaker and choose to become a priest, while another person with the same gift might become a lawyer defending social justice issues.

Ideally, a vocation is chosen when an individual shares their gifts while following the promptings of the Holy Spirit. As Frederick Buechner puts it, "The place God calls you to is the place where your deep gladness and the world's deep hunger meet."

No matter where the Spirit leads us, we are called to offer the best of ourselves to make the world a better place for everyone else.
