Mass Schedule & Confessions:


All are welcome to join us for Mass at the following times:

Pastoral Letter by David Heimann, Pastoral Associate



"After the traumatic repercussions of Jesus' death and Resurrection, it took time to learn how to communicate once again."

There is a lot of noise in our world.

That noise comes from both external and internal sources. Regardless of the stimulus for the noise, the end result is the same. Communication doesn't take place.

That word "communication" is illusive. We tend to use it use to talk about as a "thing," or a "subject." It wouldn't be unusual for us to hear a friend say, "I was a Communication Major in college," or in our places of work to have a "Communication Department." We expect them to handle the technology of websites, emails, pamphlets, and such. We treat "communication" like it is a thing.

But the word "communication" is also the word that we use when receive the Blessed Sacrament at Mass. The verb of our ritual action is that we "communicate" with God.

We've lost a sense of connection with that word in our sacred rituals and it takes a feast like Pentecost to help remind us.

At the heart of the feast of Pentecost is that divergent people were able to communicate with one another. No matter their background or the language, they could hear one another. The noise that separated them evaporated and the vitality of God's Spirit was clear to them.


Like so many things in the Bible, we take the 20 second shorthand of the story which makes it seem like it was instantaneous, but in truth, it probably wasn't. After the traumatic repercussions of Jesus' death and Resurrection, it took time to learn how to communicate once again. It took time to overcome the noise that disrupted people from seeing fully the love and mercy of God.

That should give us hope in our own day. We live in a very fractured time where multiple sides can't hear one another and worse don't even try. Politics doesn't just attack the position or debate the opposition, it is a sport that degrades the person behind the position. Our fractured nature bleeds into our actions as well. Our city was waylaid with another 52 people shot last weekend and there is no end in sight to the violence. It has gotten that the noise is so loud, we can't even hear instructions on how to turn down the volume.

But that's where the Holy Spirit breaks in and where we can invite the Spirit's kind and gentle counsel on this feast day. The miracle of Pentecost is not that we as Christians will learn to speak in different languages but rather that we will be able to hear. We'll be able to penetrate through the noise, hear God's word, and once again communicate with Him and each other.


Celebrating Mr. Allen Ackermann

Waiting for the Holy Spirit

"He enjoined them not to depart from Jerusalem, but to wait for 'the promise of the Father about which you have heard me speak' " (1 Acts 1:4).

In other words: "Ready... set... NOT YET!"

If we were one of the apostles, we might have had a hard time with the concept of waiting. Ours is not a very patient culture - we are used to instant gratification, and speaking what's on our mind and in our hearts.

Sometimes this is an admirable quality, but it can also lead to impulsive behavior. We can imagine some of Jesus's apostles were excited, particularly after Jesus rose from the dead. They wanted to get out there and proclaim the good news.

Waiting? No one has time for that! Why does Jesus want them to stay still? He needs to give them something... an advocate: the Holy Spirit. In some books of the Bible, the Spirit is also referred to as the feminine image of Wisdom. (Proverbs 1:20, 8:1-3)

How often do we wait for Wisdom? When we get excited - be it in overwhelming joy or righteous indignation - do we take the opportunity to pray for guidance before we respond? Each one of us has access to this same Holy Spirit through the sacraments we receive and by virtue of our inheritance as children of God.

Maybe we need to spend some time sitting with it while carefully waiting for the spirit of Wisdom to whisper in our ear. Spend some time at home this week inviting the Holy Spirit to be part of your decisions. Pause, reflect, consider what Wisdom might have to say before you make plans. I've heard she's worth the wait!
